# LIFE WITH GOD

GOING DEEPER IN PRAYER





Prayer is a powerful experience. In our Episcopal tradition, prayer is understood as the experience of nearness with God, through words, acts, or silence. Being near to God can take many forms. Any action taken or any activity performed that is offered up to God can be prayerful. Many common forms of prayer to God include prayers of petition, praise, and thanksgiving, as well as listening or meditating. Prayer is the way we open ourselves up to a direct relationship with God.

Although prayer can often feel like something initiated by us, prayer, at its deepest level, is a response to God. In countless ways, God is acting on us and on our world. God's actions, in love and grace, can be felt everywhere we go when we practice spiritual awareness. Prayer is the primary way in which we practice awareness of and build a relationship with God. In this second week of Lent, we are deepening our capacity to bear witness to God's work in the world and respond to that work with effective prayer practices that have been used throughout Christian history. As you take this next step, be confident in what you do, even if some forms of prayer are new to you. God is present with you, so take some time each day to intentionally reciprocate that presence.

#### Mark 1:9-15

In those days, Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased." And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him. Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."

**Reflection** Dr. Timothy M. Smith

This passage is typical of Mark. In six brief verses, the events of "those days" are laid out, beginning with Jesus' baptism and then the tearing of the veil separating heaven and earth, God and humanity. The Holy Spirit rests on Jesus as God speaks a word of blessing and affirmation. And then Jesus is driven by the Spirit into the wilderness. Mark does not share the details of Jesus' Temptation, but one can well imagine that it was the culmination of those 40 days spent communing and speaking with God. Those days in the wilderness must have been a time of reflection and preparation for what was to come. I often wondered what Jesus' prayers were during this time. Maybe they're the type of prayers we need to be praying. Mark's opening verses invite us to refocus in Lent. How can you get away to be alone with God, without distractions, and seek His voice for your life and ministry? Where in your life do you need to refocus on Jesus, his mission and his call on your life? How can you focus your prayers on the mission of God and your part in it?

#### Genesis 37:1-11

Jacob settled in the land where his father had lived as an alien, the land of Canaan. This is the story of the family of Jacob. Joseph, being seventeen years old, was shepherding the flock with his brothers; he was a helper to the sons of Bilhah and Zilpah, his father's wives; and Joseph brought a bad report of them to their father. Now Israel loved Joseph more than any other of his children, because he was the son of his old age; and he had made him a long robe with sleeves. But when his brothers saw that their father loved him more than all his brothers, they hated him, and could not speak peaceably to him. Once Joseph had a dream, and when he told it to his brothers, they hated him even more. He said to them, 'Listen to this dream that I dreamed. There we were, binding sheaves in the field. Suddenly my sheaf rose and stood upright; then your sheaves gathered around it, and bowed down to my sheaf.' His brothers said to him, 'Are you indeed to reign over us? Are you indeed to have dominion over us?' So they hated him even more because of his dreams and his words. He had another dream, and told it to his brothers, saying, 'Look, I have had another dream: the sun, the moon, and eleven stars were bowing down to me.' But when he told it to his father and to his brothers, his father rebuked him, and said to him, 'What kind of dream is this that you have had? Shall we indeed come, I and your mother and your brothers, and bow to the ground before you?' So his brothers were jealous of him, but his father kept the matter in mind.

**Reflection**The Rev. Robin Hinkle

In this season of Lent, we are given the opportunity to examine our hearts in the hope that our Lord can bring us wholeness and healing. The story of Joseph and his family shows us how this type of self-examination can begin at home. The conflicts between brothers and sisters and parents and children are often the exact place we may need to start in our journey of soul cleansing. Praying for one another—those in our families and indeed any others with whom we are in conflict—is a good first step in our journey of an amended life. When we pray deeply for those who have hurt us and we have hurt, prayers for abundant blessings of joy and peace and wholeness, God changes our hearts at the very least, and can bring His spirit of reconciliation to our relationships. Who can you pray for today?

I know who you are, the Holy One of God." But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? A new teaching—with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.

**Reflection**The Rev. Christian P. Basel

We witness Jesus's encounter with a man possessed by an unclean spirit. It may be tempting to focus solely on the dramatic exorcism, but there is a profound lesson in the radical nature of Jesus's teachings. His words possess transformative power, challenging ingrained beliefs. It's a reminder that Jesus didn't simply cast out demons, he upended conventional wisdom. Sometimes teaching can feel like exorcism. Students, both young and old, often resist the unfamiliar just like unclean spirit here. Jesus faced skepticism but persisted in delivering a revolutionary message—that the kingdom of God has come near. Educators and parents might sympathize with Jesus in navigating the multitude of eye rolls and sighs, recognizing that the battle is not against the student, but against the reluctance to embrace new ideas. Like Jesus, we too strive to cast out the demons of apathy and resistance, and to cultivate and nurture a mind hungry for God's kingdom. This Lent, may we let our Savior's fearless teachings possess us instead, and upend our lives for the better.

After sternly warning him he sent him away at once, saying to him, "See that you say nothing to anyone; but go, show yourself to the priest, and offer for your cleansing what Moses commanded, as a testimony to them." But he went out and began to proclaim it freely, and to spread the word, so that Jesus could no longer go into a town openly, but stayed out in the country; and people came to him from every quarter.

**Reflection** The Rev. Dr. Andrew Grosso

Prayer is always a collaboration. We may think that prayer chiefly involves our asking God to do something, but as often as not God asks us to do something, to be part of the work we long to see done in the world. Sometimes this means doing something active, something concrete; other times it can mean learning to surrender, to not do something precisely so God can work in ways only God can. The act of prayer itself often mirrors these two movements: sometimes we speak, but other times we're better off being quiet and still so we can better attend to what God is saying. What word might God be calling you to speak, to proclaim to the world, and how might God be calling you to learn to be still and silent?

**Reflection** Rob Springer-Kyle
