oly Scripture is the word of God contained in the Old and New Testaments of the Bible. Over centuries and millennia, people of faith listened and watched for God in the world, and when they had powerful experiences, they wrote down the stories. Some of those stories we told and retold for generations, gaining an authority that helped guide others in their own faith journeys. Put another way, the books of the Bible have proven highly valuable in forming our ancestors to be more faithful, and

so we trust that they can also impact us in similar ways. This week, the power of our sacred scriptures will bear on us.

Reading the Bible is a practice that few observe. Yet reading the Bible is one of the most powerful ways to develop our spiritual identities. It would be easy to cast aside our scriptures as outdated and archaic, but that would be a mistake. I encourage you to read a little extra from your Bible each day this week, reflecting on what the stories can still teach us today. I truly believe that you will find the gift of God's word speaking to you in surprising ways.

Just prior to our lesson for today, Jesus asked the disciples a series of questions which reveal their incomprehension of who he truly is. Yet Peter clearly identifies Jesus as God's anointed one. But upon hearing of Jesus' impending suffering and crucifixion, Peter balks leading Jesus to correct Peter. In Mark 8:21, Jesus' final question is, "Do you not yet understand?" It is made even more poignant by the use of an imperfect verb describing his speech, a verb which might well be translated, "He kept on saying to them, "Do you not yet understand?" Does this indicate that he asked each of the disciples this question? What a question for Christians, let alone for us in this second week of Lent! Do you understand who Jesus is and why He came? Do you understand the sacrifice and significance of his death upon the cross? Do you understand that your life is meant to be lived as a response to the grace found in the cross? We do not have the benefit of Jesus speaking to us face to face as the disciples did. But we do have the blessing and benefit of God's Word in the Scriptures. In them, we discover and are reminded of the answers to the above questions. In them, we see and learn about Jesus. And if them, we also see ourselves, not only as we are but whom we are called to be. I don't know about you, but I need to be reminded of that every day. And daily scripture reading can help me do just that. Make a commitment to read Scripture every day this week.

Joseph was thirty years old when he entered the service of Pharaoh king of Egypt. And Joseph went out from the presence of Pharaoh, and went through all the land of Egypt. During the seven plenteous years the earth produced abundantly. He gathered up all the food of the seven years when there was plenty[a] in the land of Egypt, and stored up food in the cities; he stored up in every city the food from the fields around it. So Joseph stored up grain in such abundance–like the sand of the sea–that he stopped measuring it; it was beyond measure. Before the years of famine came, Joseph had two sons, whom Asenath daughter of Potiphera, priest of On, bore to him. Joseph named the firstborn Manasseh, 'For', he said, 'God has made me forget all my hardship and all my father's house.' The second he named Ephraim, 'For God has made me fruitful in the land of my misfortunes.' The seven years of plenty that prevailed in the land of Egypt came to an end; and the seven years of famine be-gan to come, just as Joseph had said. There was famine in every country, but throughout the land of Egypt there was bread. When all the land of Egypt was famished, the people cried to Pharaoh for bread. Pharaoh said to all the Egyptians, 'Go to Joseph; what he says to you, do.' And since the famine had spread over all the land, Joseph opened all the storehouses, and sold to the Egyptians, for the famine was severe in the land of Egypt. Moreover, all the world came to Joseph in Egypt to buy grain, because the famine became severe throughout the world.

One of the best things we get to see through the stories of our ancient patriarchs is the way that God's appearance and presence in their life impacts their entire life and their world. This hindsight reflection shows us how God has plans for each one of us, the level of detail in which God sees us and works, and how all things in our lives, the good times and the bad, can be used for his purposes. This Lent as you read the stories of the people in Scripture, consider how God is working in their lives and in your own. May your own hindsight reflection draw you closer God and strengthen your faith in Him.

Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother."

Reflection

The Rev. Christian P. Basel

I was on a college trip to Italy one year, and while in one of the museums pondered the enormous painting *The Sacred and the Profane*, by Titian. One of my professors asked me which was which in the painting. Seeing a naked person on one side I pointed and said, "Well, that side must be the profane," to which I received some polite jeering and was reminded that what God has made is not profane, it's sacred, it's beautiful. It's we humans who have impure thoughts, not God. Something similar is going on here. The scribes label Jesus, who is most holy and most sacred, as evil. During our daily lives, I wonder what we might mislabel. Like the scribes, we might see the pure love as exhibited by Jesus as sadly out of the ordinary, so different that it might even feel subversive or wrong. But such love that causes us to look back and see ourselves in a new light is a gift. May we look at those around us, and like Jesus, call them mother, sister, and brother.

Mark 4:1-9

Jesus began to teach beside the lake. Such a very large crowd gathered around him that he got into a boat on the lake and sat there, while the whole crowd was beside the lake on the land. He began to teach them many things in parables, and in his teaching he said to them, "Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seed fell on the path, and the birds came and ate it up. Other seed fell on rocky ground, where it did not have much soil, and it sprang up quickly, since it had no depth of soil. And when the sun rose, it was scorched; and since it had no root, it withered away. Other seed fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked it, and it yielded no grain. Other seed fell into good soil and brought forth grain, growing up and increasing and yielding thirty and sixty and a hundredfold." And he said, "Let anyone with ears to hear listen!"

The scriptures themselves are very much like a field where seed has been sown. We often have our favorite passages, where the growth seems luxuriant and inspiring. And we often think of other parts of the Bible as rather barren or rocky, hard to understand and seeming not to offer much in the way of inspiration or spiritual growth. In all such instances, our encounter with the scriptures says as much about us as it does about the scriptures themselves. Often we find that when we labor for a time in a section of the scriptures that presents particular challenges, we find ourselves experiencing unexpected growth.

But that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins"—he said to the paralytic—"I say to you, rise, pick up your bed, and go home." And he rose and immediately picked up his bed and went out before them all, so that they were all amazed and glorified God, saying, "We never saw anything like this!"

Jesus comes to heal. We are often very aware of our need for physical healing. And yet our greatest need for healing comes in the form of the forgiveness of our sins. In this world we are constantly faced with the gap between good and evil. It is easy to fall into the gap and get stuck in the negative and distracted by the horrible things that people say and do. It has been my experience that every time I am faced with bad circumstances and turn to Christ for help, only then am I able to allow God to fill in the gaps with his grace and help me move from negative human emotions to a place of peace, forgiveness, and hope. I would suggest that from today's readings we should constantly be preparing ourselves, to expect the worst but hope for the best. This attitude can only be achieved through staying close to our source of life, hope, faith, and love found in and through Jesus Christ.
