

The flowers adorning the altar are given to the glory of God and in thanksgiving for the wedding anniversary of Carolyn and Wyatt Rousseau.

"Cortège et Litanie" began as five pieces of incidental music requested by a playwright friend and originally written for small orchestra. Then, on one of his American tours. Dupré was overheard playing the piece privately on the piano and was encouraged by another friend, the American impresario Alexander Russell, to transcribe it for organ: "You have the time ... on the railway journey. It'll be superb!" And so it was. Later, Dupré wrote the version for organ and orchestra which he first gave in America on the huge Wanamaker organ with the Philadelphia Orchestra under Leopold Stokowski.







The Lesson Acts 8:26-40 (seated)

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: "Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth." The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the

chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.





"Greater Love Hath No Man" is one of the most beloved and popular English cathedral anthems from the previous century, and for good reason. Not only does its text outline so much of the Christian life, its music, ranging from soaring melodies to inspiring modulations to heart-felt dissonances, depicts the text in ways that are as gratifying as they are artistically masterful. "Who his own self" is given to two soloists before the choir enters to crescendo to choral fanfares at "ye are washed, ye are sanctified" which ultimately climax at "marvellous light." The anthem's most poignant writing is reserved for St. Paul's charge that concludes the anthem.

All baptized persons of any age regardless of their denomination and tradition are welcome to share in the banquet of the Lord's Supper.

Here a Proper Preface is sung or said on all Sundays, and on other occasions as appointed.

During the season of Easter, we return to the practice of the early church and stand during the Prayer of Consecration and the Post-Communion Prayer.

You may also stand to receive Communion at the altar rail.



from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

All We remember his death,
We proclaim his resurrection,
We await his coming in glory;

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with Saint Michael and all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *AMEN*.


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

Л Moses Hogan was an American composer and arranger who remains one of the most well-known names related to African-American spirituals. Over his lifetime, he published 88 arrangements for voice. This arrangement of the hymn by William Monk was dedicated to Professor Joseph Schwartz at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music and was originally sung by the Oberlin College Choir under the director of Hugh Floyd.







The famous "Fugue in G" by J.S. Bach is a brisk, rhythmic, four-voice dance. It is technically brilliant, lighthearted and energetic with its frolic triple meter. Bach wrote this fugue presumably around 1705-1706.
